Pope Leo XIV

On May 8, 2025, the Catholic Church ushered in a new era with the election of Cardinal Robert Francis Prevost as the 267th Pope of the Roman Catholic Church. Taking the name Pope Leo XIV, he becomes the first American to ascend to the papacy.

Born on September 14, 1955, in Chicago, Cardinal Robert Prevost's journey to the papacy is one marked by devotion and service. Raised in the United States, he joined the Augustinian Order and was ordained a priest in 1982. His early ministry took him to Peru, where he served for over a decade. Cardinal Prevost's commitment to serving others was evident in his leadership within the Order of Saint Augustine, where he served as Prior General from 2001 to 2013.



Later, as Bishop of Chiclayo, Peru, and President of the Pontifical Commission for Latin America, Cardinal Prevost demonstrated a deep understanding of the challenges facing the Church, particularly in Latin America, and the world. He brings a unique perspective as someone who has navigated both the North and South American continents, bridging cultural gaps within the global Church.

In this time of transition and renewal, we are reminded that the Church is not simply led by one person, but by the Holy Spirit who guides us all. Pope Leo XIV is a servant of Christ and a shepherd to the faithful, and we are called to walk with him in prayer and solidarity. Let us lift up our hearts in prayer for our new pope, for the Church, and for the world. May Pope Leo XIV's papacy be a beacon of hope, healing, and unity for all.

Good Shepherd Sunday & World Day of Prayer for Vocations

On Good Shepherd Sunday, we are called to reflect on the image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd, who lovingly guides, nurtures, and protects His flock. This day also marks the "World Day of Prayer for Vocations," inviting us to reflect on the vocations of those who dedicate their lives to serving others, especially priests, teachers, parents, and anyone entrusted with the care of others.

As we contemplate the role of a shepherd, we realize that a shepherd's responsibilities extend far beyond mere leadership. A shepherd is called to lead, feed, nurture, comfort, correct, and protect the flock. These same responsibilities fall on priests, teachers, parents, and all those who care for others in their various roles. Jesus, the Good Shepherd, shows us that caring for others requires sacrifice, love, and constant vigilance. It's not just about giving instructions—it's about walking alongside those we serve, offering them compassion, guidance, and protection.

In the readings today, we see the early Christian community responding to God's call. In Acts, Paul and Barnabas, despite opposition, continue to spread the Good News, reflecting the universal mission of Christianity. They boldly share God's message, even when rejected. The Responsorial Psalm reminds us, "We are His people, the flock He tends," reminding us that, as those entrusted with the care of others, we are all part of God's flock, called to serve with love and dedication.

In Revelation, we see Christ as both the Lamb and the Shepherd. This vision of the glorified Christ offers great comfort to all who suffer for their faith, encouraging them that Christ will shelter them through the hardships of life and bring them to eternal joy. This is a reminder for all of us, especially those who serve others, that our work is never in vain—Christ, the Good Shepherd, is with us every step of the way.

As priests, teachers, parents, and leaders in any capacity, we are entrusted with the care of others. We must love those in our care, protect them from harm, nurture their growth, and guide them with wisdom and compassion. We must recognize that our roles require ongoing dedication, not just during specific tasks or moments, but in the way we live each day. Our work, no matter how challenging, is an opportunity to reflect Christ's love and care.

Just as pastors, teachers, and parents care for others, so too are we called to support and care for those who serve us. As a community, we must listen to the guidance of our shepherds—whether that's following the advice of our pastors, or the instruction of our teachers. Our role as "sheep" is to cooperate with those entrusted with our care, offering support and encouragement.

Support your pastors and teachers by actively engaging in your parish, school, and community. Participate in the sacraments, attend Mass, and offer constructive feedback to help them in their mission. Support your parents and caregivers by showing gratitude and love. Help create a home and community environment where faith is nurtured and the responsibilities of caring for others are shared.

Let us all pray for an increase in vocations to the priesthood, diaconate, religious life, and the many other ways God calls people to serve. Parents, especially, are called to foster vocations by creating a loving and faithcentered home, praying for and supporting those who feel called to religious life, and encouraging them in their journey. We can also contribute by supporting seminarians and religious communities through prayer and financial aid.

As those entrusted with the care of others, let us embrace our roles as shepherds, walking with those in our care through every season of life. And let us always remember that the Good Shepherd, Jesus Christ, walks with us, leading us to eternal life. By answering His call with love and dedication, we will build stronger communities and a more compassionate world.
