#### **Our Mission**

## Am I a good neighbour?

A scribe once asked Jesus a profound question: "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus pointed him straight to the heart of the Scriptures: Love God—and express that love by loving your neighbor. But for the scribe, "neighbor" meant only someone like him—a fellow scribe or Pharisee. Certainly never a Samaritan or Gentile! So, to open his heart, Jesus shared one of His most powerful parables: the Good Samaritan.

Through this story, Jesus turned the question around. The real question is not "Who is my neighbor?" but "Am I a good neighbor?" In other words: Do I open my heart to the hurting stranger on my path, or do I walk by with excuses and indifference? The parable of the Good Samaritan teaches us three attitudes toward our neighbor.

The thieves' attitude: "What's yours is mine—and I'll take it." Greed, exploitation, and violence are ancient sins that still plague our world today. Some rob with clubs; others rob with pens, deceit, or power. Whether it's corruption, betrayal, or exploitation—whenever we love things more than people, we steal from the dignity God gave them.

The priest and Levite's attitude: "What's mine is mine—and I'll keep it." These religious men knew the Law but missed its spirit. Fear, selfishness, or rigid legalism stopped them from helping. Like them, we can hide behind excuses: "It's not my problem." But when we do only what is required, we fail to love.

The Samaritan's attitude: "What's mine is yours if you need it." He crossed boundaries of hatred and history. He took risks. He gave his time, his money, and his heart. The Samaritan saw a wounded enemy—but treated him as a brother. No rule compelled him, but love did.

So, who are we on life's Jericho Road? The indifferent passerby—or the merciful neighbor? Do we walk past the wounded—those hurting in our homes, our workplaces, our communities—or do we stop, risk, and pour out compassion?

Jesus calls us to be Good Samaritans. The lawyer's question "Who is my neighbor?" reveals a self-centered heart. Jesus wants to transform that question into a mission: "To whom can I be a neighbor today?"

It starts small: a kind word, a listening ear, an act of generosity, a step across a barrier that divides. The world is desperate for Good Samaritans—those who see the invisible, stand with the forgotten, lift up the broken.

Pope St. John Paul II put it simply: "Your neighbor is the living image of God the Father, redeemed by the blood of Christ, filled with the Holy Spirit. Love them—even if they are your enemy—with the same love God has for you."

Sometimes we must also let ourselves be touched by Good Samaritans. Sometimes God's mercy reaches us through unexpected people—those we once despised or avoided. Sometimes reconciliation begins with an outstretched hand, like the historic handshake between enemies who dared to build peace.

So let's pray: Lord, open our eyes and soften our hearts. Make us true neighbors. Help us love not just in words, but in action—right here, right now, for every wounded soul we meet along life's road.

This week, be the Good Samaritan. Let your mercy be the visible sign of the invisible God.
